## **A View from the Pew**

### **Thy Word Is a Lamp Unto My Feet**

Just a year ago, late August 2021, Josh Shaarda challenged us to read through the Bible in a year, by reading three chapters a day. I don't know about you, but I didn't make it! However, in my attempt to reach the goal, something special occurred in my devotional life. I choose to read chronologically, which really "puts things into perspective."

I also employ two "techniques," taking notes on each chapter as I read. The first step involves writing down repeated words. Sometimes a word appears just twice, earning it the "right" to appear in my journal; however, occasionally a word or phrase shows up three or more times. No matter the number, the significance lies in the repetition.

Second, I go back through and scan the passage for God's attributes and write these down. They may actually be stated, like He is Almighty, merciful, compassionate, angry, Sovereign. Alternately, they can be construed from the text. God is Creator, judge, holy, omnipotent, omniscient, etc. In this way we take time to learn more about Him.

Psalm 119:103-104 reads "How sweet are Your words to my taste, sweeter than honey to my mouth! I gain understanding from Your precepts; therefore I hate every wrong path." Probably today, perhaps more than ever, it's difficult to get into the Word. We're busy, and we're tired. Everything out there fights for our time and attention. Realistically, we are in a spiritual battle, so none of us is free from Satan's attacks. To equip ourselves, we must know Scripture as well as correct application. The Bible is the living Word. Therefore we need to pause, to cherish it, to "eat" it. Do those around us "catch" us in Scripture, especially our children, grandchildren, neighbors and friends? The truth is, "Children Learn What They Live," and whatever we're "caught" doing impacts others, as we saw in the April Echoes. "Whether we realize it or not, we make waves, which directly affects" others, for years to come.

You didn't make it through the Bible in twelve months? Well, you could double up on reading, or, better yet, you could simply keep reading! It's never too late to begin...or to continue. Catch and taste the blessings God provides in His Word.

### Sunday School and Catechism

The new Sunday School and Catechism year is upon us once again. Our Sunday School year begins Sunday, September 18th after the morning service. We are excited for the opportunities this year provides. Note that this year, Sunday School and Catechism will NOT meet on Sundays we celebrate the Lord's Supper.

This year the lead teacher for Pre K through 1st grade will be Amy Kalkman. She will have a helper to assist her each week. Libby Dendel will be the teacher for 2nd grade through 4th grades. The two groups will meet for singing. Pre K through 1st grades will be learning their lessons using felt to tell the story. The 2nd graders through 4th grades will be learning the same stories but will be going back to the Bible to read and hear the stories directly from God's word. Each group will be doing worksheets that follow their story for the week. There will be a Christmas Program December 18th during the morning service.

The Catechism aged kids from 5th through 8th grade will be taught by Bruce Tiemeyer. They started a unit on Hebrews through Revelation which studies Christ the Messiah, Christ as the King of

Kings, and Christ as the judge of the universe at the end of last year, and will pick that up this fall. After which they will return to the beginning of the Bible and pick up a study of Genesis where they will learn about the Creation, the Fall, the Flood, the Abrahamic covenant, the Patriarchs, that ends with Joseph. The 9th through 12th graders will be taught by Jonathon Kalkman. Last year they learned about the Reformed faith through Lewy VanderMeer's study entitled, "What we Believe". This year, they will revisit the Heidelberg Catechism, and study the first half of this important catechism of the Reformed faith.

## Guatemala Mission Team Update



Antonio and Manuel shared about the work at Fundacion Salvacion. The rules and laws governing orphanages in Guatemala have changed dramatically. Due to covid and financial issues in the local community the orphanage is not receiving the community support that it used to. The orphanage needs support to provide repairs to maintain a safe and positive environment for the kids. The Guatemala team asked the deacons of our church to use funds raised for the orphanage to be transferred to Fundacion Salvacion. The deacons have approved that request.

When the next trip to Guatemala will be is still unknown. Please pray that God will bless the

orphanage and all the staff as well as the kids. Pray that He will give wisdom to the team as they seek to do His will in caring for the kids as well.

## Zucchini Casserole

1/4 cup chopped onion  
6 cups unpeeled, shredded zucchini (can remove the seeds)  
1 cup shredded carrots  
1 cup sour cream  
1 can cream of chicken soup  
1—8 oz Stove Top stuffing (herb)  
1 stick of melted butter or margarine  
1 pound of bacon or hamburger (cooked)

Boil onions, carrots, and zucchini for 5 minutes in salted water. Drain.

Add 1 pound fried, crumbled bacon or 1 pound cooked hamburger. Mix with soup and sour cream.

Melt butter and mix with stuffing mix. Put 1/2 of the stuffing on the bottom of a 9x13 baking dish. Put vegetable mixed with soup and sour cream on top. Sprinkle the rest of the stuffing mix on top. Bake at 325 degrees for about an hour. Can put shredded cheese on top when it is served.
