Time to Agape

Will They "Know We Are Christians by Our Love"?

Perhaps seeing February on the calendar prompts us to think about the word *love*. After all, a holiday in this month, Valentine's Day, focuses people, around the world, on that four-letter word. For the Christian, however, what, in the final analysis, defines *love*?

Basically, in the Greek, it takes four different words to grasp the concepts (the various meanings) of *love*, unlike the single, limited word of the English language. First, we might consider *storge* (store-gay) for an empathy bond, like love for family. In scripture, we find this usage in Romans 12:10—"*Love* each other with genuine affection, and take delight in honoring one another."

Then there's *eros* (air-rohs), romantic love, the one so adulterated and degraded in today's world that, conceivably, anything goes. A third type, *phileo* (fil-leh-oh) belongs to the idea of friend bond, thus Philadelphia as the city of brotherly love.

However, the ultimate *love*—and the word occurring 106 times in the Bible—we know as *agape* (uh-gah-pay), or, <u>unconditional</u> and <u>sacrificial</u> "<u>God</u>" <u>love</u> (the verb form appears as *agapao*). Let's turn our attention to this *love*, thinking about ramifications in and for our own lives.

We might do well to ponder **agape love** in terms of requiring, recognizing, and realizing.

First, requiring. Where does the Lord command that we love like He loves? "The agape of God has been poured out within our hearts through the Holy Spirit Who has been given to us" (Romans 5:5). Logically, then, as Philippians 2:1-2 urges/demands, "Therefore, if there is any encouragement in Christ, if there is any consolation of agape, if there is any fellowship of the Spirit, if any affection and compassion, make my joy complete by being of the same mind, maintaining the same agape, united in spirit, intent on one purpose." Then there's the familiar account in John 21:25ff, where Jesus twice asks Peter, "Do you agapao Me?" Yet the disciple, also twice, admits only to a brotherly connection (phileo). So

the third time, the Lord, in His mercy, asks, "Do you *phileo* Me?" and, grieving, he responds, "Lord, You know I *phileo* You." Yet Jehovah desires *agape*. "I pray that your *agape* may overflow more and more and that you will keep on growing in knowledge and understanding" (Philippians 1:5).

Should we doubt the "command" nature of this, we need only read the words of our Lord Jesus as recorded in John 15:9-12. "As the Father has **agapao** Me, so have I **agapao** you. Abide in My **agape**. If you keep My commandments, you will abide in my **agape**, just as I have kept My Father's commandments and abide in His **agape**. These things I have spoken to you, so that My joy may be in you, and that your joy may be full. This is My commandment, that you **agapao** one another as I have **agapao** you."

What about *recognizing* the existence of this *love* in our lives and the lives of others? Where's the proof? I Thessalonians 1:3 points us in that direction. "As we pray to our God and Father about you, we think of your faithful work, your *agape* deeds, and the enduring hope you have because of the Lord Jesus Christ." Moreover, "...we have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and your *agape* for all of God's people" (Colossians 1:4). As "those who have been chosen of God, holy and *agape*, put on a heart of compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience" (Colossians 3:12). Jesus affirms, if we exhibit the fruit, then, "By this all men will know you are My disciples, if you have *agape* for one another" (John 13:35).

Requiring, recognizing, and, finally, *realizing*. "Beyond all this put on *agape*, which is the perfect bond of unity" (Colossians 3:14). Since the fundamental part of being made in the image of God begins with a delight in the Son, if we *agape* Him, then "nothing renders us so like unto God as our love unto Jesus Christ, for he is the principal object of his love" (the Puritan John Owen writes).

What does this look like? "This is love: that we walk in obedience to His commands" (II John 1:6a). Additionally, we read, "For you have been called to live in freedom, my brothers and sisters. But don't use your freedom to satisfy your sinful nature. Instead, use your freedom to serve one another in *agape*" (Galatians 5:13). Also, "Let no debt remain outstanding, except the continuing debt to *agape* one another, for whoever *agapao* others has fulfilled the law" (Romans 13:8). Indeed, we know that "Three things will last forever—faith, hope, and *agape*—and the greatest of these is *agape*" (I Corinthians 13:13).

Therefore, contemplate the truth found in I John 4:7-8: "Beloved, let us **agape** one another, for **agape** is from God; and everyone who **agapao** is born of God and knows God. The one who does not **agapao** does not know God, for **God** is **agape**.

With 106 biblical references to **agape**, we barely scratch the surface here, but if God mentions **agape** that many times, then...we conclude,

"What is important is faith expressed in agape" (Galatians 5:6b).
