Reflections from the Pulpit

A New Sermon Series: Dear Church – Christ's Letters to the Seven Churches



This past month, we have journeyed together through the first four churches in Revelation 2, listening to Christ's living words for His people. These letters remind us that Jesus still walks among His church—with eyes that see, a voice that speaks, and a love that calls us back to Himself.

Ephesus (Revelation 2:1-7)

A church strong in truth but cold in love. Christ calls us not only to right doctrine and faithful service but also to rekindle our first love for Him. Our devotion must never become duty without delight.

Smyrna (Revelation 2:8-11)

A persecuted church fragrant with faithfulness. Christ calls us to endure trials with courage, trusting that even suffering can become a testimony of His worth, crowned with eternal life.

Pergamum (Revelation 2:12–17)

A church tempted to compromise. Christ calls us to resist cultural pressures and hold fast to His Word, reminding us that His obedience and sacrifice empower our faithfulness.

Thyatira (Revelation 2:18–29)

A church growing in love and service, yet in danger of tolerating sin. Christ's fiery eyes see both our faithfulness and our failures, calling us to holy discernment and deeper allegiance to Him, the bright Morning Star.

As we continue with the final three churches in the coming weeks, may East Martin CRC be found faithful—holding truth with love, enduring with hope, rejecting compromise, and growing in devotion to Christ. His Word is clear: those who overcome will share in His victory.

A View from the Pew

Things God Cannot Do: God Can't Deny Himself

With this edition of the View from the Pew, we come to our final consideration of things God cannot do, specifically, that God cannot deny Himself. What do we mean by this? God cannot deny His own nature: a holy "Person" of love, mercy, compassion, and faithfulness.

In his second epistle to Timothy (2:11-13), the apostle Paul alerts us to this fact.

If we died with Him,
we will also live with Him.
If we endure hardship,
we will also reign with Him.
If we will disown Him,
He also will disown us.
If we are faithless,
He remains faithful,
for **He cannot deny Who He is**.

While we humans cannot fully plumb the depths of God's character, we should make a concerted effort to explore more intimately Who He is. In II Corinthians 1:3, Paul pens, "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies and God of all comfort." Reformed pastor Dane Ortlund fleshes out this idea for us when he writes, "Yes, the Father is just and righteous. Unswervingly, unendingly. Without such a doctrine, such a reassurance, we would have no hope that all wrongs would one day be righted. But what is his heart? What flows out from his deepest being? What does he beget? Mercies."

Frequently in the Old Testament, the Lord describes (a testimony to the character of God) Himself as merciful or compassionate, most notably first in Exodus 34:6-7 ("And He passed in front of Moses, proclaiming, 'The Lord, the Lord, the compassionate and gracious God, slow to anger, abounding in love and faithfulness, maintaining love to thousands, and forgiving wickedness, rebellion, and sin. Yet He does not leave the guilty unpunished; He punishes the children and their children for the sin of the parents to the third and fourth generation."")—later quoted in Psalm 86:15; 103:8; 145:8. Further, He reiterates this in various narratives, as when He relents from punishing Israel after their sin. "Nevertheless in Your abundant compassion. You did not utterly consume them nor forsake them, for You are God, gracious and compassionate" (Nehemiah 9:31).

The New Testament scriptures continue this idea when they consistently narrate for us that, when people flock to Jesus, He "ha[s] compassion on them and heal[s] their sick" (Matthew 14:14 and <u>many more</u>). *Splanchnizo*, the word Matthew employs here for compassion, indicates "deeply moved in

your gut, in a yearning, visceral way."

Not only do Paul and Matthew paint God as love, mercy, and compassion, but so, too, does James in his letter. However, here, when James uses the word *compassionate*, "he adds a prefix (*polu-*) meaning 'much' or 'greatly.' The Lord, according to James 5:11 is 'much compassionate.' And that the Lord is much compassionate or greatly compassioned is synonymous with saying that he is merciful," explains Ortlund. "To speak of God the Father as 'the Father of mercies' is to say that he is the one who multiplies compassionate mercies to his needful, wayward, messy, fallen, wandering people."

In the Old Testament, when Moses asks God who he should say sends him to Pharaoh, the Lord responds with "I am who I am." When we think about *I Am*, we should recognize "[t]he triune God as three in one, a fountain of endless mercies extending to, meeting, and overflowingly providing for us in all our many needs and failures and wanderings" (Ortlund). The bottom line is that He is our *Father* and Christ "the radiance of the glory of God and the exact imprint of his nature" (Hebrews 1:3).

Over the past six months we examined things God cannot do, beginning with God cannot learn; then God cannot be seen; God absolutely cannot not tolerate wrong; God cannot change; God cannot be tempted; and now, God cannot deny Himself. So let's enthusiastically sing the Sunday school song

My God is so great, so strong and so mighty, there's nothing my God cannot do!

At the same time, let us give thanks for these six "activities" our God cannot do.

At the beginning of this article, we read II Timothy 2:13, which solidifies the beauty of all of this. Indeed, the Lord remains faithful, for He cannot deny Himself. Underscored in the Old Testament, we know, "His goodness and mercy follow us all the days of our lives (Psalm 23:6a).

Our God is Who He is, forever faithful. Omniscient (all-knowing), He is also omnipresent (everywhere present), and omnipotent (all-powerful), and praise His Name that He is the Great I Am, and **He cannot deny Himself!**

Sunday School and Catechism

It's hard to believe that the fall education season is almost upon us. This year our Sunday School and Catechism classes begin on Sunday, September 21st. Jonathan Kalkman will once again be teaching the high school classes (9-12) in the room directly off the sanctuary. They will be completing their study "What We Believe" and will begin a study of the Heidelberg Catechism.

Bruce Tiemeyer will teach middle school (5-8) in the fellowship room by the kitchen. They will begin with a study of I Samuel to Esther then finish the year with a study of Job to Malachi.

Libby Dendel will be teaching 2nd through 4th grade.

Amy Kalkman and Nancy Leep will be teaching our Prek - 1st grade in a classroom off the fellowship area. They team together to do various stories from Old and New Testament and do singing in the basement.

Everyone is surrounded by relationships. First, and foremost with God, our Creator; then with others including family, friends, fellow workers, and casual acquaintances; and finally, ourselves. Excelling in Relationships, is a clear and simply written guide for daily Christian living and a biblical guide for solving and overcoming present and potential pitfalls that we all face at some time or another in our everyday interpersonal relationships.

Throughout the lessons Meengs makes a strong argument for following Christ's directions found in Matthew 25:35–40 for putting God first, others second, and then self. He also emphasizes the need to fix our own hearts through confession, forgiveness, and repentance before we can fix our own problems properly. The final lesson is devoted to a study of Psalm 23.

Summer Squash Casserole

3 summer squash — slice, boil until soft and mash
