The Wonder of With

Tucked in between accounts of battles and kings, we find in our Bibles this little gem of a book called *Ruth*. Yet, beginning and ending with Naomi, the reader sees not Ruth, but Naomi, in only the first five verses go from a scarcity of food to a scarcity of hope. In the end, though, over the course of an interwoven love story between Boaz and Ruth, we witness the wonder of with.

On Friday, September 5, 2025, at Friendship Christian Reformed Church, 208 attendees of the Bible League International Michigan Conference (fourteen from East Martin) fellowshipped, worshipped, and learned about our incredible Lord and His desire for our lives. The day's offering (to reach the underresourced church around the world) came to \$10,100, along with an additional \$565 from a new feature, sales of gently used jewelry.

This year's emcee for this annual event, Pastor Ken Kuiper, opened the dayconference by focusing our attention on important characteristics of God. Thinking about II Peter 3:1-13, 18, he posed the question: Why has Jesus not come back yet? It's certainly not because He's forgotten! Rather, God is patient and knows every single person in history who's going to come to faith in Jesus Christ, some of whom have not yet been born. Let each of us be glad that He didn't come back before we accepted Him. Points to consider: (1) give thanks that He patiently waits for all to come to Him; (2) meanwhile, live holy and godly lives; and (3) remember how God gathers His people: It comes from the Word.

And our keynote speaker from Proverbs 31 Ministries, Alicia Bruxvoort, directly took us to that powerful Word, in the book of *Ruth*. Did you know that Ruth means "companion"? We all need someone who helps "make our legs braver." Well, it's not wise to do life alone. Because we were made to do life together. And we don't need to do big things to make an impact for God in history. In fact, it often simply boils down to **withness**. [No, that's not a typo!] Ruth 1:16 shows us the "wonder of with." Ruth says to her mother-in-law Naomi, "Do not press me to forsake you in turning back from following you; for where you go, I will go, and where you lodge, I will lodge. Your people shall be my people, and your God, my God." To sum up, "withness" means I'm committed to sharing your steps with you. We don't have to know all the answers. But you are not alone. "I will go where you go."

Alicia exhorted and challenged us to give the gift of the **wonder of with**. We need to see people the Lord puts in our path and *align* our walk with our words. Every step validates "I

see you." Let us "[b]e devoted to one another in love. Honor one another above [y]ourselves" (Romans 12:10). The words "I'm with you" don't mean much if they spill off our tongues but don't steer our steps.

How do we do just that? In a back and forth interview, Bible League CEO Jos Snoep and Ministry Trainer and pastor, Johnny Delgado, brought out the absolute necessity of hunger for the Word. As in Acts 12:24, "... the word of the Lord continued to grow and to be multiplied." Notice that the Word continued to grow. Clearly, we can't do discipleship or evangelism if we don't have the Word of God. As Alicia then pointed out, "We may be able to watch without engaging our hearts, but we cannot truly see without engaging our souls..." and for that we need the Word. "Lord, open the eyes of my heart" (Ephesians 1:18).

Following our break for a delicious lunch. John Scafe from Legacy Thrift noted that each of us is on a journey. Similar to the Israelites of old, we camp until the Lord moves us on to the next step. God sets up boundaries. He drives down stakes. Then we live in our area of influence, as true followers of Jesus Christ. Similarly, the **wonder of with** is a resolution to meet each other where we are, continued Alicia Bruxvoort. There's a significant difference between a chaperone and a companion, however. The name Ruth means companion, one who keeps company with another. "I will stay where you stay," the Moabitess declares. It's meeting others where they are—like pitching a tent. Literally or figuratively, tarry throughout the night with someone the Lord puts in your path. It's not enabling; it's engaging.

The truth is, God adopts all of us, His children, into His family (Ephesians 1). It's a call to learn from our many differences and celebrate our ONE hope. Thankfully, we don't have to erase our differences to embrace walking together. "For there is one body and one Spirit, just as you have been called to one glorious hope for the future" (Ephesians 4:4 NLT). Also, the **wonder of with** isn't always about the ultimate destination. Rather, it's a promise to stay near during the "night halts," to join the journey which is still in process, just like the Old Testament Israelites—and Ruth and Naomi.

The wonder of with is a courageous commitment to honesty and authenticity. Actually, it's in the grit of life that we need the grace of withness. Our imperfect presence often speaks louder than *perfect* words. Finally, it's a daily decision to choose faithfulness. "A remarkable life is made up of a thousand unremarkable steps," Alicia shared, quoting Pastor Jeff Manion. Let someone taste and see that the Lord is good, and he or she will want more of what s/he sees. In reality, we hinge our lives on our hope. "So here's what I want you to do, God helping you:" writes Paul in Romans 12:1 MSG. "Take your everyday, ordinary life your sleeping, eating, going-to-work, and walking-around life—and place it before God as an offering."

On that September Friday, we listened to and participated in music, thoughtfully and intentionally selected by worship leader Sara Denzel—prelude music of songs and hymns, a special music number from Sara, and lots of joyful and vibrant singing, from an early set that focused on Jesus' Name to additional sets that beautifully enhanced and enriched each and every conference segment.

During the final portion, the wonder of with [involves]...an overflow of our relationship with Jesus, God-with-us. "Your God will be my God." We have a God Who sees, Emmanuel, God with us, 24/7. It's a commitment for the long haul. But if we don't keep company with Jesus, we won't keep company with others. We can't do it in our own strength either. The secret to walking well is prioritizing our walk and letting Him empower our steps. Jesus instructs us, "Walk with Me and work with Me. Watch how I do it. Learn the unforced rhythms of grace. I won't lay anything heavy or ill-fitting on you. Keep company with Me and you'll learn to live freely and lightly" (Matthew 11:25-30 MSG).

Alicia identified three results of walking/keeping company with Jesus: Such companionship changes what we see (We have access to eternal riches.). It changes how we serve/give (We offer hope.). It changes whom we spotlight (We discern opportunities [Acts 3:1-9]). Ultimately, let's be

"Ruth's" and, like the early disciples, be "recognized as *companions of Jesus*" (Acts 4:13). To do so, we must entwine ourselves around Him and tether ourselves to His heart.

God 's desire for our lives? God calls us to

live in The Wonder of With!
