Reflections from the Pulpit



The Promise and the Sign: Lord's Day 27 and the God Who Does Not Change

This month, our preaching and teaching brought us to Lord's Day 27, a beloved portion of the Heidelberg Catechism that asks one of the most tender and important questions of the Christian life:

"Why do we baptize our children?"

Lord's Day 27 teaches us that God includes not only believers, but also their children, in His covenant and in His church. This is not based on sentiment or tradition, but on the unchanging covenant character of God Himself. Because God is immutable, the God who embraced believers and their children in the Old Testament is the same God who embraces believers and their children in the New.

From Abraham to Pentecost (Acts 2:39), God continually declares, "The promise is for you and for your children."

If God once welcomed children into His covenant people, and He is a God who does not change, then His covenant pattern has not been revoked. To baptize our children is to confess:

God's promise remains.

God's heart for families remains.

God's grace to generations remains.

God's character remains the same—yesterday, today, and forever.

Baptism does not mean our children are automatically saved, nor does the water itself wash away sin. But baptism does proclaim that God has placed His name, His promise, and His covenant mercy over our children. It is God's signature on the child: "You belong to My church, and My promises run toward you."

Lord's Day 27 reminds us that infants, no less than adults, are recipients of the promises of forgiveness, renewal, and the work of the Holy Spirit.



They are placed inside the community where faith is nurtured, the Word is heard, and Christ is proclaimed. Baptism is not our testimony to God—it is God's declaration to us, a visible sign and seal of the Gospel.

Pastoral Visits and Shepherding

This month was rich with pastoral visits, prayer, fellowship, and gospel encouragement across our community.

I had the privilege of visiting Phyllis and Larry Tuinstra, praying for Phyllis' leg and for their daughters as they face medical concerns. We also visited Henry and Nancy Tuinstra before they depart for Florida the day after Thanksgiving to serve with Wycliffe. We prayed with gratitude for their faithful ministry and asked God to bless their winter of service.

I was grateful for the opportunity to attend a conference at Mid-America Reformed Seminary, where I was encouraged by the teaching and was able to be reunited with friends and professors.

I also led the membership class for Henry Tuinstra and Cece Sutherland, a conversation that led to Henry's public profession of faith and Cece's baptism. We rejoice in God's faithful work in their lives as we also commit to them as their spiritual family, to love, care, and nurture them in the faith.

This month also included a pulpit swap with Pastor Matt of Martin Reformed Church, strengthening our partnership in gospel ministry here in our township.

A particularly meaningful visit was with Marge Sietsma, Seth's mother, who has been attending our services regularly since Seth, Keri, Luke, and Kelsy joined our church. Hearing Marge's testimony and seeing God's grace in her life was a blessing.

I also met with Pastor Mark Immick of City on a Hill in Plainwell. He graciously toured me around their church and shared stories of God's faithfulness to their covenant community. We hope to have him preach at East Martin CRC in January to share updates about their church-planting work.

Each of these visits—whether over coffee, a meal, or a simple conversation—reminded me how God builds His church through relationships saturated with the Word, prayer, and genuine fellowship.

As we enter December, we rejoice in the new communicant members God has added to our family, and we continue to pray for more regular attendees to consider the blessing of formal membership in our congregation.


How Adventurous are You?

Several weeks ago, we met with one of the Disaster Response Services (DRS) team coordinators from World Renew, the humanitarian outreach division of the Christian Reformed Church. The purpose of this meeting was to clarify the objectives for our serve trip and to identify where DRS could most effectively utilize our skills and expertise.

Currently, DRS operates at 11 locations across the United States. Following a thorough review, the number of prospective work sites has been reduced to four: Floyd County, Kentucky; Mitchell County, North Carolina; Madison County, North Carolina; and Carter County, Tennessee.

The sites we are currently considering were either damaged by hurricane Helene in September 2024 or by severe flooding from heavy rainfall in July 2022. We aim to establish a site by late November. Please pray that God will direct us in finding a location where our abilities can be most effective, as well as for the skills needed to assist those impacted.
