A View from the Pew

Shepherds, Sheep, the King, and the Lamb

One of the most encouraging and well-known passages in the Bible begins with these words, "The Lord is my

shepherd..." (Psalm 23:1). Yet, how often do we think about the deeper meaning? This phrase makes us His sheep, doesn't it? David, the writer of this psalm, knows all about shepherding and unruly sheep; and in his lifetime, David the sheep herder becomes David, king of Israel.

Let's take a look at what the written word of God (both the old and new testaments) says about the Incarnate Word: a <u>reversal</u>, a *King* Who becomes a *Shepherd*...and a Lamb. Who is this Shepherd? What qualities characterize this Shepherd? What does all this mean for His sheep?



On earth it begins in a fairly insignificant village in Judea, Bethlehem by name, when a heavenly host of angels announces a baby's birth (to outcasts, the riff raff of society, dirty, smelly shepherds living out in the fields nearby). Immediately these humble shepherds rush to see and worship the "Savior—yes, the Messiah, the Lord" (Luke 2:11). Interestingly, this Child, Jesus, destined to cause the rising and falling of many, raises up those who believe in Him but literally becomes a stumbling block for those who disbelieve.

In reality, the "tables turn," for Emmanuel, God with us, proclaims, "I am the Good Shepherd. I know My own sheep, and they know Me" (John 10:14). "They, too, will listen to My voice…" so let us heed the words recorded in Hebrews 3:15a. "Today when you hear His voice, don't harden your hearts." Instead, "Acknowledge that the Lord is God. He made us and we are His. We are His people and the sheep of His pasture" (Psalm 100:3).

Totally, this Shepherd is no ordinary shepherd. Jesus Christ embodies multiple qualities that should motivate us to fall down before Him. First, He **seeks** the wandering ones individually. "If a man has a hundred sheep and one of them gets lost, what will he do? Won't he leave the ninety-nine in the wilderness and go to search for the one that is lost until he finds it?" (Luke 15:14). Moreover, His heart, full of pity, yearns to *lead and guide*. Matthew tells us (9:36), "When He saw the crowds, He had compassion on them because they were confused and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd." The Shepherd Who guides, the Lord Who provides, the Voice Who brings peace in the storm.

Furthermore, He *cares.* <u>Picture this</u>: "He will <u>feed His flock</u> like a shepherd. He will <u>carry the lambs</u> in His arms, <u>holding them close</u> to His chest. He will <u>gently lead</u> the mother sheep with their young" (Isaiah 40:11). Yes, this truly is our "*Good* Shepherd. The Good Shepherd *sacrifices* His life for the sheep" (John 10:11).

What blessings abound for the Good Shepherd's sheep? Ultimately, what we have in our Shepherd is greater than what we don't have in life, because this One, our Creator-Shepherd, *provides* eternal **salvation**. "So don't be afraid, little flock. For it gives your Father great happiness to give you the Kingdom" (Luke 12:32). "And when the Great Shepherd appears, you will receive a crown of neverending glory and honor" (I Peter 5:4). "Then we, Your people, the sheep of Your pasture, will thank you forever and ever, praising Your greatness from generation to generation" (Psalm 79:13).

Are we willing to follow this Shepherd? When we allow our Shepherd to guide us, we enjoy contentment and refreshment. When we choose to sin, however, we go our own way and cannot blame God for the environment we create for ourselves. Indeed, "He guides me along right paths, bringing honor to His Name" (Psalm 23:3), and for Him that path of righteousness leads up a steep hill, to a cross at the top. We see that God displays His great love for us by sending His Son into the world to die on the cross as the ultimate, perfect, atoning sacrifice for our sins. This Shepherd becomes the sacrificial Lamb!

Therefore, (1) let us believe and, with the heavenly hosts, (2) proclaim

Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to men on whom His favor rests.

Starting today, the benediction in Hebrews 13:20-21a needs to echo in our ears, "...may the God of peace—Who brought up from the dead our Lord Jesus, the great Shepherd of the sheep and ratified an eternal covenant with His blood—may He equip [us] with all [we] need for doing His will"!

Chewy Macaroons

Yield: 4 1/2 dozen — prep: 5 minutes Bake 10 minutes/batch

5 1/3 cups flaked coconut1 can (14 ounces) sweetened condensed milr2 teaspoons vanilla extract

In a bowl, combine all the ingredients. Drop 2 inches apart onto greased baking sheets. Bake at 350 degrees for 10-12 minutes or until lightly browned. With a spatula dipped in water, immediately remove to wire racks.

Savory Party Bread

Yield: 6-8 servings Prep/total time: 30 minutes

1 unsliced round loaf (1 pound) sourdough bread 1 pound Monterey Jack cheese, sliced 1/2 cup butter, melted 1/2 cup chopped green onions

2 to 3 teaspoons poppy seeds

- Cut the break lengthwise and widthwise without cutting through the bottom crust. Insert cheese between cuts. Combine butter, onions, and poppy seeds, drizzle over the bread. Wrap in foil, place on a baking sheet.
- 2. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes. Unwrap and bake 10 minutes longer or until the cheese is melted.
